What is Intimate Partner Violence?

IPV is a pattern of assaultive and coercive behaviors, including physical, sexual, psychological and economic abuse that one partner asserts over the other. It is a choice made by the abusive partner to disrespect, demean and hurt their partner in an attempt to manipulate and control what they do or how they behave. It is not a disagreement, a marital spat, or an anger management problem.





Statistics & Reasons for Staying

- Statistics
 - ▶ 1 in 3 Women will experience IPV in their lifetime.
 - ▶ 1 in 7 Men will experience IPV in their lifetime.
 - It may take up to seven times before a survivor leaves for good.
- Reasons for Staying
 - Fear
 - The Children
 - ► Financial Stability

What does DAS do?

All of our services are provided from an empowerment based and trauma informed approach.

- Education & Awareness

DAS provides all services free of charge to the participants and their families. We provide:

- Safety Planning
- Risk Assessments
- Crisis Intervention
- Supportive Counseling
- Advocacy Services
- Support Groups
- Courthouse Accompaniment
- Information and Referrals
- Assistance with Relocation Applications
- Economic Education for Freedom & Justice Program
- Child Welfare Advocate



Services Provided Fiscal Year 2022-2023

- ▶ 3055 shelter nights to 109 children (46), women (61) and men (2), unduplicated.
 - ► Every night represents a night where a survivor or their child was able to sleep safely without fear of abuse.
- 257 crisis calls answered
- ▶ 1394 (duplicated) various services by Shelter & Outreach
- Outreach services to 103 (unduplicated), 98 women & 5 men number of participants in the Upper, Middle and Lower Keys.
- ▶ 11 unmet requests for shelter.

The Shelter That We Lost During Hurricane Irma







What We Really Lost

Remember FY 22-23? This represents 15 beds in the Lower Keys only.

> 3,055 shelter nights to 109 individuals, children (46), women (61) and men (2), unduplicated. An average of 28 nights per individual.

Every night represents a night where a survivor, their child or family member was able to sleep safely without fear of abuse.

> Imagine if the Middle Keys Shelter had been open.



- When we project numbers with data from the past, before the shelter was lost during Irma, just the Middle Keys shelter would look like this.
 - > 250 individuals with an average of 28 nights per individual equals 7,000 nights of safety from fear of abuse.

What Some of Our Spaces Will Include ...

Business Center

Computers, printers, paper, office supplies and internet will be available for adults to work. They can search for jobs, places to live or create documents necessary for finding jobs. No remote work will be done from here as it would take time away from the needs of others. They are able to connect to the internet from their rooms if they have remote jobs.

Dress for Success Center

* Business attire will be kept here and provided to individuals that need it. Clothing is frequently donated by business women in the area.

Play Room

❖ The play room will be located adjacent to the kitchen, where children can play and not be in the kitchen where hot food is being prepared and parents can keep an eye on them while preparing meals. It is also located near the dining room and living room, so the children can play near other activities.

Kennel Space

• We will have the ability to house up to six pets in kennels inside the facility. Eventually, after the shelter is complete, we hope to have another single purpose building on the property for a kennel.

What Some of Our Spaces Will Include (cont.) ...

Peace Garden

A quiet place in the rear of the yard with benches, plants and possibly a water feature.

Tranquility Room

Just like it sounds, a quiet place without a TV. It is for adults only. It will have a library and meditation audio, if desired.

Not as "fancy" as the other spaces, but very nice additions.

Community Training Room

This space will be used by our staff for support groups, training we provide and meetings. It will also be available to the community to use for trainings and meetings. For confidentiality it will be located on the non-shelter side of the facility.

Outreach Suite

This will also be on the non-shelter side of the facility and will house our Marathon Outreach staff and be "home base" for the Outreach Advocates from the Upper & Lower Keys. They have their own full time offices in those locations.

How can I help?



- ➤ Help us raise the necessary capital to Rebuild-Recover-Restore our Emergency Shelter.
- Become a member of the Domestic Abuse Shelter Board of Directors.
- Become a member of the Domestic Abuse Shelter Advisory Committee, which is a special committee designed for the capital fundraising of this project.









Cost of the Project

- 2019 The construction was quoted at \$3,500,000.00
- 2023 The construction cost was estimated to increase to \$5,000,000.00

What We Currently Have

- Money Market \$643,000.00 (approximate)
- ➤ Potential good news from the state of FL. We are in the 2024 budget for \$1,000,000.00. It is flagged as a priority project, but still requires approval from the governor.

Options

- 1. Wait until we have the full amount and build.
- 2. Build in Phases.
 - Phase I estimated at \$3.5M walls, roof, electric, plumbing, etc.
 - Phase II estimated at \$1.5M interior finishes, security, etc.
